### What's HOT— Shrub Roses!

Shrub roses may be just what your garden needs—beautiful, long-lasting color and hardy for our Minnesota winters! Although not as refined in appearance as the delicate hybrid tea rose, shrub roses will win hands down in the "Resistant to Bugs and Diseases" and the "No Fuss" categories!

Shrub roses are emerging as a popular plant in Midwestern gardens for their colorful foliage, small, continuing blooms, and fall seed pods (hips). They can be massed for a colorful focal point in your garden. They can used for a decorative hedging. Some of the more compact varieties make a colorful ground-cover. And larger varieties can be used for screening. Mix them in a perennial or foundation garden! Shrub roses are so versatile!

The term, "shrub rose" is used to categorize a wide variety of roses that just don't seem to fit anywhere else. They are becoming such a popular addition to landscaping that new varieties are being developed every year. Many varieties have recurrent bloom. They continue to grow new blooms on new wood during the season. And if their canes die back during a hard winter, they will grow back in the spring and still provide a summer of beautiful blooming.

Shrub roses thrive in full sun and can be planted from spring to fall, however, they should not be planted until the danger of frost has passed.

Roses need to be watered every 7 to 10 days during dry weather. Water should be applied at the base of the plant. Try to keep the foliage dry. Also keeping a layer of mulch around the base of each shrub will help control weeds and conserve moisture.

Flakne's can supply a large variety of shrub roses. The following three series of roses have proven to be some of the most beautiful and hardiest available. The roses described in this article are just a few from the following three series: Explorer, Parkland, and Town and Country.

#### 1. The Explorer Series:

These roses were developed at the Ottawa Experimental Station in Canada and were named after Canadian explorers. They are extremely hardy and bloom repeatedly. They are also very tolerant of salts so they are good choices near roadsides.



Explorer Series: The "John Franklin" rose is known for its fragrant and showy red clusters, with double flowers 2 to 2 1/2 inches in diameter. This shrub grows in full sun and will reach 3 to 4 feet tall. It is resistant to black spot and mildew.



Explorer Series: The "George Vancouver" is a disease resistant 3 foot shrub that blooms abundantly in June and recurrently throughout the summer months. The flowers are double, fuchsia-red, about 2 1/2" in size.



Explorer Series: The "Royal Edward" is a low spreading semiminature rose. It grows to 18" in height and is resistant to blackspot and powdery mildew. Dark pink buds open to medium pink semidouble flowers, 2" in diameter, and flower from June until frost.

#### 2. The Parkland Series:

The Parkland Series is a series of hybrid roses developed at the Morden Research Station in Canada. This series is composed of complex crosses with native prairie roses. They are winter hardy and suited well for our Minnesota winters. Even with an occasional freeze to the ground, they will produce new growth in the spring.



Parkland Series: The "Morden Blush" has 3" "hybrid tea" type blooms of double ivory flowers with pale pink centers. This shrub grows 2 to 3' tall and provides beautiful blooms throughout the summer months..

### Beautiful roses (continued)



Parkland Series: The "Morden Amorette" grows to 3 feet tall. It's slightly fragrant, 4 inch double red flowers offer a stark contrast against its large dark leaves.



Parkland Series: The "Winnipeg Parks" boasts 2 1/2" semi-double bright cherry red flowers which bloom in clusters all summer. This shrub will grow in a compact form.



Parkland Series: The "Morden Fireglow" will reach 2 feet in height. Fragrant, double, scarlet red flowers, 2 to 2 1/2 " in size, bloom abundantly in June, then intermittently throughout the summer.



Parkland Series: New from the Morden Research Center in 2001, "Hope for Humanity" is named in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the Canadian Red Cross Society. It has an upright growth pattern, reaching 2 feet in height. Its deep wine-red flowers measure 2 to 2 1/2" across and bloom throughout the summer.

## **3. The Town and Country Series:** These roses were developed by Paulsen of Denmark, one of the world's leading hybridists. These hardy roses bloom throughout the growing season.



Town and Country Series: The "Kent" is a compact spreading shrub with semi-double white flowers, 2 inches in size. The foliage is glossy green and is resistant to disease. This shrub will grow to 3 feet in height and blooms several times throughout the season.



Town and Country Series: "Central Park", with it's soft peach flowers with yellow centers, makes a good ground cover. It blooms recurrently throughout the season. It is also disease resistant.



Town and Country Series: The "Aspen" boasts deep yellow buds which open to pastel single flowers. It grows in a compact form, up to 16" in height, and makes a an excellent ground cover.



Town and Country Series: The "Martha's Vineyard" is a 3' tall shrub which makes an excellent hedge. Semi-double hot pink flowers with a yellow center bloom throughout the summer months.

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
